- Course Description:**
- This course is designed for students who have completed Japanese 101 to offer them opportunities to develop fundamental proficiency in modern Japanese. Our emphasis is on linguistic competency in four components; listening, speaking, reading and writing. In addition, students will gain the knowledge and understanding of Japanese culture. The instructor will introduce and explain new expressions and grammatical patterns, give students the opportunity to practice them, and help them learn to speak and perform correctly in a variety of cultural and social situations. This course will cover from Lesson 7 to 12 of "Genki" textbook.
  - If you have taken Japanese of this level at a different university, you must see the instructor immediately regarding placement.

- Course Objectives:** At the end of the course students will be expected to perform in all four skills — speaking, listening, reading and writing — at a basic level of proficiency. More precisely, students will be able to:
- describe physical attributes.
  - read and write about 87 more *kanji*.
  - state thoughts, opinions, plans, and predictions.
  - describe experiences, desires, and obligations.
  - compare people and things.

- make reservations and appointments.
- describe symptoms of an illness.
- make sentences with “plain (short) forms” as well as “polite forms”.
- use contextually appropriate style of speech such as casual speech and explanation mode of speech.
- have a basic understanding of Japan such as cultural traditions, public transportation, climate, folktales, family, and manners.

- Attendance:**

- Participation:**
- You are expected to voluntarily ask and answer the questions, present your own ideas, and discuss with the classmates and the instructor. In order to participate actively in class with accuracy and fluency, you are expected to read the textbook carefully, answer the questions in the textbook or the workbook, and learn the vocabulary according to the course schedule before coming to class. You may also utilize audio materials to prepare for the class. Make sure to review constantly, going back to the earlier lessons frequently.

- Assignments:**
- Workbook assignments are regularly assigned. (See Schedule.) There will be additional assignments from time to time.
  - Your completed homework should be turned in at the beginning of class on the due date to be accepted for full credit. Those submitted later but before the next class starts will earn half of the credit. Those submitted on the following class will earn only one fourth of the credit. Any assignments submitted after that will not be accepted. If you cannot submit your homework because of your absence, you may submit it at the beginning of the next class and get full credit. Be sure to check your daily schedule carefully.
  - Papers containing many errors and/or blanks must be re-submitted to get credit.
  - Please use a pencil and an eraser, not a pen.
- Reading:**  
(Recording)
- There will be two reading assignments. You will practice reading Japanese passages, record your reading, and submit the best ones.
  - The first assignment is due on February 20. The second assignment is due on April 6.
  - Details will be explained in class.
- Composition:**
- There will be one composition assignment. You will be asked to write two-page composition in Japanese. The due date is April 24.
  - Other details will be explained in class.
- Quizzes:**
- There will be sixteen quizzes. (See Schedule.)
  - If you are late to class, you won't be given extra time to complete the quizzes.
- Lesson Test:**
- There will be five end-of-lesson tests. The test for Lesson 12 will be included in the final examination.
  - If you are late to class, you will not be given extra time to complete the tests. Please be sure to come on time.
  - If you miss a test (or quiz), you should arrange the time and place for the make-up as soon as possible. Please note that you cannot get 100% of what you make, if you take a make-up test (or quiz) after the scheduled time.
- Oral Exam:**
- An oral exam is scheduled for the last class. It will be approximately for 6 minutes per student.
  - Details will be explained in class before the exam.
- Midterm Exam & Final Exam:**
- The midterm exam will be held in the regular class period, and the final exam will be held according to the University schedule. You must take them on the days scheduled.

  - If you are late to class, you won't be given extra time to complete the exams.
  - Details will be explained in class before each examination.

- It is vital for your acquisition of Japanese to be exposed to it as much as possible. You should listen to the *Genki* MP3 CD-ROMs every day. Listen to the dialogues, vocabulary, drills, and the reading from the Reading section in the textbook as much as possible. Do not just passively listen but speak with the CD, using the pause and rewind buttons.
  - You also need to listen to the audio materials in order to complete the listening comprehension practice in the workbook.
  - If you don't have the CD-ROMs, you can listen to them at the language lab.

- Please come to our Language Table to practice speaking Japanese, if your schedule allows. For 40 minutes, we speak only Japanese; No English! The schedule is in Sakai course site.
