**Course Description:**

This course aims to help students develop their language skills in four areas-speaking, listening, reading, and writing-in Korean at the advanced level. It covers grammar and vocabulary, reading comprehension, fluency, conversation manners, and public speaking. Emphasis will be on the appropriate use of Korean in a variety of situations including schools, companies, and formal/informal meetings. This course also enables students to understand Korean culture and history and to develop cross-cultural insights by comparing Korean society with US society. Korean history, image of Korea, and current social trends in Korea will be discussed for a solid understanding of Korean culture in which Korean language is embedded.

**Learning Goals:**

Successful completion of the course fulfills the following Asian Languages and Cultures Departmental Learning Goals for Korean majors and minors:

- Majors in Korean will acquire in-depth knowledge of the Korean language as well as the literature and culture of Korea. Majors will be able to demonstrate oral, reading, and written proficiency in the language and develop critical skills in analyzing and interpreting literary, historical, and cultural texts. Students will acquire the literary, cultural and linguistic competency necessary for continuing onto post-graduate study or employment requiring such cultural knowledge and/or linguistic skill. Students will learn the cultural heritage of Korea within the larger context of East Asia through a wide and coherent curriculum, which includes courses in the following humanities and social science disciplines: literature, visual culture, history, religion, language and linguistics.
- Minors will be introduced to the cultural heritage of Korea through courses on literature, history, civilization, language and linguistics. Minors will be able to communicate effectively (listening, speaking, and writing) in Korean and will learn critical skills in analyzing and interpreting historical and cultural materials appropriate to the student's area of specialization. Students will achieve advanced linguistic competency and be able to demonstrate practical skills in using Korean for translation and interpretation. Students will

be able to relate relevant issues to other areas in the humanities.

## Course Requirements and Grading Policy:

(1) **Class Readiness (10%)**: Attendance + Active Participation

- o Class attendance is required. Students are expected to attend every class and arrive on time. Poor attendance, frequent lateness and early departure will affect your grade. If your absences **exceed 2 classes, you will not receive an A regardless of your semester scores**. If your absences **exceed 5 classes, you may fail the course**. 2 late arrivals or early departure equal one absence.
- o Students are expected to **actively participate** in class. Students should read the assigned materials for each week and be prepared to discuss them in class.
- o You may not leave the classroom during class without the instructor's permission. Use of digital devices will also cause deduction in readiness scores without warning. They must be turned off and put away during class.

(2) **Assignments**: Late submission of assignments will result in partial credits.

- o **Essay (15%)**: Students must submit **three short essays** throughout the semester. Further directions will be given in class. At least 800 letters<sup>1</sup>, typed, 12 (font size), double-spaced, 1-inch margin. Style sheets will be provided via Canvas course site. All essays should be submitted in two format - 1) hard copy in class and 2) electronic copy via Canvas Assignment. Also, students are required to **revise their essays and resubmit them** by the date indicated on the syllabus. Adequate grammar, vocab., and expressions level and organization skills for 300 level Korean are required.
- o **Homework Assignments (5%)**: Students are required to complete and submit in-class worksheets as HW. Dates are indicated on the syllabus.

(3) **Exams (40%)**: There will be one-minute-long, in-class midterm and one final exam during the final exam period. If you have to make-up a test/exam for an absent, you will only get 80% of your actual score.

(4) **Vocabulary Quiz (10%)**: There will be one vocabulary quiz for each section. The quiz will be on basic meaning and usage of the vocab. There will be no make-up for a missed quiz and missing a quiz is the equivalent of a zero (0). Contact the instructor if your absence is justifiable. Memrise flash card will be prepared by instructor (Join the class group through Canvas course site).

(5) **Oral Presentations (10%)**: All students are required to give two oral presentations (one

5 minutes online presentation and one in-class presentation). Additional instructions will be given in class.

- (6) **Final Project (10%):** As a final project, all students are required to give a group presentation on a Korean film and historical background of the film. Additional instruction will be given in class.
- (7) Visit the Canvas course site for announcements. There will be absolutely **NO extra credit assignment**. If you are worried about your grade, come to see your instructor as soon as possible.
- (8) Do not use google translator for your works. Use dictionary when you need to look up a vocabulary (e.g. <http://dic.naver.com/>, <http://dic.daum.net/>)
